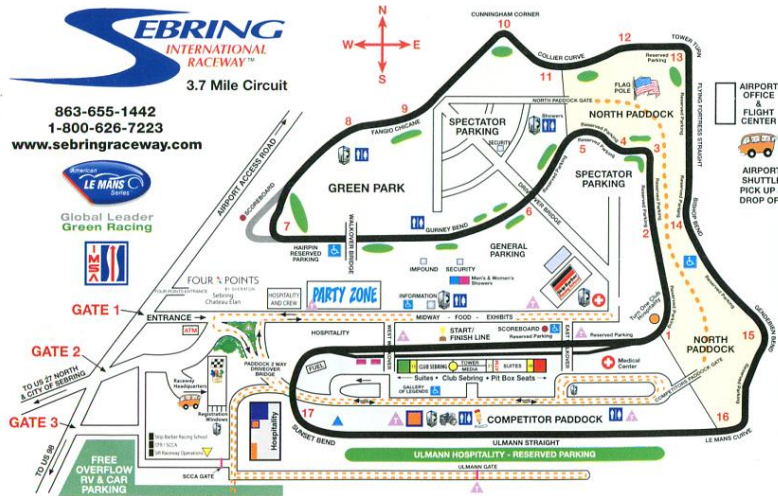

ENDURANCE RACING AT SEBRING

Nestled among the orange groves and cattle ranches of Highlands County, Sebring may seem an unlikely place for America's premier sports car race. But every year, on the third Saturday in March, the scent of orange blossoms and the roar of the world's fastest sports cars combine to make Sebring one of the world's greatest motor racing traditions.

Sebring's road course originated from a WWII B-17 training base known as Hendricks Field, constructed in 1941. While few remnants of the air base still exist, the track utilizes portions of the old Army Air Force airfield runways.

Sports car enthusiast and aviation businessman Alec Ulmann promoted the first sports car race at Sebring in 1950, and established the 12 Hours of Sebring in 1952. Since then, some of the greatest moments in sports car racing history have taken place at Sebring. Sebring has long been more than a race, and its festive atmosphere and international following make it an eclectic crowd, spiced with celebrities, college students on spring break, hundreds of automotive journalists and thousands of fans from around the world.

Today Sebring's 12-hour endurance race is the premier event of the American Le Mans Series. Inspired by the 24 Hours of Le Mans in France, it attracts the world's best sports car racing teams.

Former winners at Sebring include racing legends such as Mario Andretti, Stirling Moss, A.J. Foyt, Phil Hill, Dan Gurney and Juan Manuel Fangio. Manufacturers such as Ferrari, Porsche, Shelby, Chaparral and Jaguar have also tasted victory at Sebring.

Several different classes of cars compete at Sebring. The premier category of entries are the Le Mans prototypes, featuring exotic, high-tech machines capable of speeds well over 200 mph, yet able to endure Sebring's tough race track for twelve non-stop hours of racing.

The GT classes of cars include production automobiles similar to those spectators drive to the track, but highly-modified for racing. Familiar names such as Porsche, Ferrari, Corvette, BMW and other manufacturers often field teams in the GT classes.



The Sebring track is 3.7 miles long and includes both asphalt and concrete surfaces and 17 different turns. The 12 Hours of Sebring race concludes at night, and runs no matter what the weather is. The Sebring track has evolved into America's finest road racing facility, complete with its own luxury hotel, corporate suites overlooking the track, and numerous other amenities.

Sebring's race week is four days long and includes a variety of supporting events and off-track activities. The fan-friendly environment of Sebring and the

American Le Mans Series includes autograph sessions with the drivers, question and answer events with leading teams and displays of famous race cars from Sebring's six decades of history.

A unique aspect of Sebring International Raceway is the variety of viewing options for spectators. Reserved trackside camping/parking spaces allow race fans a front-row seat, and all Sebring tickets offer complete access to the paddock and garage area where the teams are located.
